Bagworms Are Out to Get Your Trees!

Bagworms are caterpillars that molt into moths in the adult stage. They hatch from their eggs in mid-to-late June, then spin silks to catch the wind and balloon to other plants. Bagworms



feed throughout the summer and given enough room, they may nest on the same plant indefinitely; they are especially fond of Arborvitae (evergreen members of the cypress family) and Juniper trees. However, they can feed on many kinds of trees including both evergreen and deciduous trees.

These small caterpillars feed on the outer layer of the leaves or needles of their host, causing browning, usually starting at the top of the tree. Young bagworm caterpillars feed on the upper

Light the Night for Mental Wellness



Mental health-related issues have historically been taboo subjects—something swept under the rug and rarely discussed publicly. However, in recent years, mental health has begun to garner the attention that it has long deserved. Village resident Pamela Oliver is doing her part to shine a light on mental wellness, particularly among youth. The suicide of the son of a close friend was Mrs. Oliver's call to action. Believing that her friend's son was just one of many young people suffering unbearably in silence, Mrs. Oliver set out to be the change that she wanted to see. "This hit close to home...this was someone I watched grow up. His death by suicide moved me to do something," said Mrs. Oliver.



On Saturday, October 8, she hosted "Light the Night for Mental Wellness," a three-hour event focused on mental health wellness and suicide prevention, at Sergeant Means Park. The event, jointly sponsored by the Kristin Oliver Memorial Charities, NBC Chicago, Rich Township and the Olympia Fields Park District, featured the personal testimonies of several people whose lives have been touched by mental health issues and suicide and a candlelight vigil, among other activities designed to raise awareness. A variety of local organizations, mental health experts and providers, including the National Alliance on Mental Health (NAMI), Sertoma and Rich Township, were on hand to speak one-on-one with attendees and offer resources to interested guests.



Mrs. Oliver, an assignment editor with NBC Chicago, and her

husband Kelvin Oliver, a Village trustee, whose daughter Kristin succumbed to a rare heart cancer in 2020, know the pain of losing a child. In their daughter's honor, the Olivers established the Kristin Oliver Memorial Charities. "Kristin was always concerned about the mental health of her family and friends," shared Mrs. Oliver.

When asked about the takeaways she hoped attendees would gain from the event, Mrs. Oliver stated that she wants people to know that "It's okay to say I'm not okay." Further, she wants to encourage others to lead with compassion. "If you see someone in distress, Mrs. Oliver says, ask them 'Are you okay?'"

Mrs. Oliver is on a mission to prevent the suffering and self-inflicted harm that often results from depression and untreated mental illness. And clearly, others are listening to her pleas—in the aftermath of the Light the Night event, several other communities have requested that she sponsor similar events for their residents. Mrs. Oliver's goal is to make Light the Night an annual event. "I look forward to lighting the night next year," said Mrs. Oliver. While it's difficult to quantitatively measure the success of events like Light the Night, per Mrs. Oliver, "If we can touch one life, then we've been successful."

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Stay Informed about Emergencies with CodeRED

The CodeRED emergency notification system is an extremely high-speed telephone communication service that can deliver customized pre-recorded emergency messages directly to homes and businesses via voice, email and text. The service is free to residents and businesses within the Village of Olympia Fields.

We encourage all Village residents and business owners to sign up for CodeRED. It is an indispensable tool for communicating critical emergency information such as natural disasters, public safety matters, power outages, traffic detours and watermain breaks. CodeRED sends alerts about emergency and non-emergency events affecting the Village.



Holiday Landscape Awards Season is Approaching

The holidays are just around the corner, and the Olympia Fields Beautification Committee is looking forward to receiving nominations for the annual holiday landscape awards from each subdivision in Olympia Fields. The Beautification Committee will disseminate information to the homeowners' association (HOA) presidents about the nomination/award process, in early December.

The HOA presidents may nominate as many homes as desired in their subdivisions. The top three nominees from each neighborhood will receive signage designating them as a nominee, to be placed in their yards. The nominees will then be judged by the Beautification Committee. The top three holiday landscapes will be chosen from the nominated homes.

Homes are nominated and judged for holiday landscape displays that demonstrate curb appeal, creativity, originality and coordination of décor to the home. Judging will take place in December. Check with your HOA presidents for more details.

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surface of the leaves and may eat enough to create small holes in the leaf. Older caterpillars can consume entire needles or leaves. Heavy infestations, characterized by foliage that has been eaten away, can be unsightly. Such infestations kill branches and decimate whole plants. A healthy deciduous tree or shrub that has been defoliated by these pests may be able to produce a new flush of leaves and survive. However, a defoliated evergreen cannot push out an additional set of leaves and is more likely to decline or die. It is important to note that bagworms pose no threat to human health.

Bagworms are much easier to eradicate when they are small. They are susceptible to chemical treatment into early July. An insecticide with malathion, diazinon or carbaryl can rid you of a bagworm problem, if applied to bushes and trees when the worms are still young larvae.

Fielding Your Questions

Want to join a Village advisory board, commission or committee? Need a list of Village-approved contractors? Selling your home? We are here to help you navigate these and other thorny issues. Read on...

- ♦ **Joining an Advisory Board, Commission or Committee:** Residents interested in joining a Village advisory board, committee or commission are encouraged to complete an Application for Appointment to an Advisory Board/Commission/Committee, which can be downloaded from the Village website, under Permits and Applications. Applicants must also submit a current resume along with the application to Village Hall. All appointments are made by the Village President.
- ♦ **Obtaining a List of Approved Contractors:** All contractors who perform work in the Village are required to be licensed and approved by the Village. Contact the Village's Building

Department at 708-503-8000 ext. 3401 to obtain a list of approved contractors.

- ♦ **Are you a contractor seeking to obtain Village approval?** The Contractor's License form can be found on the Village's website, under Permits and Applications. Additionally, all contractors and subcontractors must pay an annual \$100 fee and submit a Certificate of Insurance to the Village.
- ♦ **Selling Your House:** Residents planning to sell their home are required to schedule a Point-of-Sale Inspection prior to the sale. Applications for Point-of-Sale Inspections are available on the Village website under Permits and Applications. The fee is \$50 per inspection. Inspections are conducted on Tuesday and Thursday mornings. Additionally, homeowners must schedule a final water meter read at least two business days prior to closing. The Village will issue a Certificate of Occupancy once the final water bill has been paid and all code violations have been remediated.

Village Focus

Homeowners' Associations: HALO Program

Strong and thriving communities don't just happen. They are carefully cultivated by the people who inhabit them. Citizen involvement in the future planning and governance of the Village is essential to creating a socially and economically viable community. In the Village of Olympia Fields, that involvement is embodied in its Board of Trustees, advisory boards, commissions, committees and homeowners' associations, all of which comprise residents who are committed to seeing the Village flourish. Our new Village Focus column will introduce you to these groups and the work they do on behalf of Olympia Fields. Our goal is to not only educate but also encourage broader involvement among residents for the betterment of our Village.

In this issue, our focus is on the Village's Homeowners' Associations (HOAs). There are 15 HOAs in Olympia Fields—one for each subdivision. The HOAs actively promote the quality of life in their subdivisions and, by extension, the Village at large. One of the most effective ways that HOAs can proactively work to improve and protect their subdivisions and residents is by participating in the Homeowners' Association Liaison Officers (HALO) program, which fosters collaborative relationships between Village residents and the Olympia Fields Police Department (OFPD). Each HOA has an assigned OFPD officer.

HALO officers should be considered the first point of contact between residents and the OFPD for non-emergency, quality of life and minor law enforcement matters. A component of community policing, the HALO program is an effective vehicle for relationship building between the community and law enforcement. We strongly encourage HOAs to get to know their HALO officers. To that end, HOA leadership teams should consider inviting their HALO officer to their HOA meetings to meet residents and establish connections.

OFPD Goes to School








