OFPD Accreditation Is Official

It's official! Chief Marc Maton, first vice president of the Illinois Law Enforcement Accreditation Program (ILEAP) Executive Board, formally presented the OFPD with a plaque in recognition of the department's outstanding achievement in obtaining Tier One accreditation. The OFPD is the 58th police department in the entire state of Illinois to achieve accreditation, which is an extremely rigorous process requiring proof of meeting or exceeding 69 areas of ILEAP standards, representing best practices for developing high-quality law enforcement services and protocols. The majority of OFPD officers are college educated, and some officers have graduate level degrees or are currently working toward such degrees. Additionally, women comprise 25 percent of the force. Special thanks to Administrative Sergeant Donald Dean and Sergeant Michael Smith, who took the lead in managing the internal accreditation process. 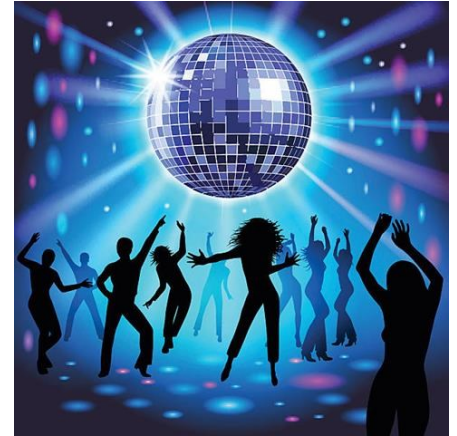
Franciscan Health Foundation Hosts "Franciscan Fever — A 70s Soiree"

Phase II Renovations Planned for Sgt. Means Park

Sergeant Means Park is one of Olympia Field's three community parks. It boasts 20 acres of amenities including a playground, picnic areas, a 20-hole disc golf course, soccer fields, tennis courts, baseball field, sledding hill, and meeting center with banquet facilities. The park also houses the administrative offices for the Olympia Fields Park District.

The proposed Sergeant Means Park Phase II project includes renovation of existing infrastructure and will provide additional recreation opportunities for all ages and abilities. Improvements will include a renovation of tennis courts into multi-use tennis courts and pickleball



courts, a new picnic shelter, new bag toss games, rain garden/pollinator garden, extension of the existing trail system, and expansion of native prairie plantings with interpretive signage.

The Olympia Fields Park District was awarded an OSLAD grant for Phase I improvements at Sergeant Means Park in Fiscal Year 2019 for the following recreational components: an accessible playground, improved accessible walking path, installation of a small picnic shelter, native prairie plantings and new fitness stations. The Park District

has submitted another OSLAD grant to fund the Phase II improvements. In August 2023, the community was invited to participate in a public hearing on the proposed Phase II renovations.

Let's Talk About Swales and Culverts

With a few exceptions, the majority of the subdivisions in the Village of Olympia Fields do not have sewers. What they do have are swales and culverts. For those who don't know, a swale is a low lying, trench-like depressed area of land used for water drainage.

A culvert, which is the homeowner's responsibility to maintain, is the pipe through which water flows into the swale. Swales and culverts are critical to the Village's storm water management protocol; when unobstructed, they ensure that water flows efficiently, preventing flooding and water back up. When swales are filled in with flowers, trees, debris or dirt, or are paved over, they can become obstructed, preventing water flow and increasing opportunities for flooding.

Likewise, damaged or clogged culverts can also cause problems, as they prevent adequate water flow into the swales. So, take care of your swales and culverts—make sure they are performing at peak level.



Emergency Calls— Did You Know...?

When you dial 708-503-8100, the police non-emergency number, your call goes directly to the Olympia Fields Police Department. However, when you dial 911, your call goes to SouthCom Dispatch, which provides fire, police and emergency dispatch services for the villages of Olympia Fields, Matteson, Park Forest and Rich-ton Park. SouthCom serves approximately 65,000 residents in Cook and Will counties.



50/50 Tree Program Cancelled for 2023

The Olympia Fields Beautification Committee's 50/50 Tree Program is cancelled for fall 2023 due to the Periodical Cicadas expected next spring. The spring 2024 Brood XIII will emerge around soil temperatures of 60 degrees and could last up to six weeks from April to June.



Periodical Cicadas appear every 17 years and can damage tree branches due to laying their eggs on small twigs.

The female does this by cutting two parallel slits in a twig where she will lay approximately 24–28 eggs. Some females can lay up to 600 eggs, causing a lot of tree branch damage over time. After the eggs hatch at six weeks, the young cicadas fall to the ground where they burrow into the soil and spend the next 17 years feeding on small roots.

Upon the advice of the Morton Arboretum and University of Illinois Extension, Olympia Fields, along with surrounding villages and towns, has decided to cancel its tree sharing program for this season. Newly planted young trees would be very susceptible to the cicada brood damage. The Beautification Committee plans to offer the 50/50 Tree Program again in fall 2024.
