Monthly Water Billing Is Here!

Monthly water billing is in full effect! All residential and commercial water and sewer users officially transitioned to monthly billing as of April 2023.

Here's the Good News:

- Water utility bills will now be spread over more months, resulting in lower monthly payments, enabling users to better manage their expenses, and easing the burden of having to make large lump sum payments.

- Monthly billing will make it easier for users to identify leaks, plumbing issues, and other problems *before* they result in costly water bills.
- Monthly billing will facilitate a better designed, more user-friendly billing statement.

Information to Note:

- The Village will no longer distribute third notices or orange water shut-off door tags.
- Reminders about the payment of previous balances and disconnection notices related to those delinquent amounts will be mailed to residential and commercial customers.

Benefits of being a Tree City USA community

- Trees help absorb the sounds of traffic in urban areas by 40%.
- Neighborhoods with trees are seven to nine degrees cooler than those without.
- Trees reduce energy costs up to 25% by shading buildings and protecting them from winter winds.
- Homes with trees have higher property values.
- Green space plays a major role in improving mental and physical health.
- Planting and maintaining trees absorbs carbon dioxide in the atmosphere, mitigating the effects of climate change.

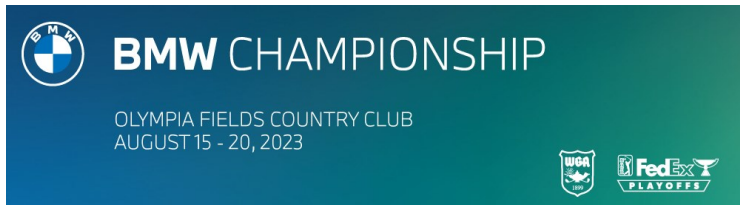

Sign Up for CodeRED?



The CodeRED emergency notification system is an extremely high-speed telephone communication service that can deliver customized pre-recorded emergency messages directly to homes and businesses via voice, email and text. The service is free to residents and businesses within the Village of Olympia Fields. It is an

indispensable tool for communicating critical emergency information such as natural disasters, criminal activity, power outages, traffic detours and watermain breaks. CodeRED sends alerts about emergency and non-emergency events affecting the Village via telephone, text and email.

Arrange to have branches picked up from my residence?

Branch Pickup Program

The Department of Public Works will collect branches every Tuesday until October 31. Residents living on the **East side of the Village** (The Greens, Graymoor, Wysteria, Olympia Fields East, Maynegaite and the Reserves of Maynegaite) will have branches picked up the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of every month—weather permitting. Residents living on the **West side of the Village** (Arcadia, Hawthorne Hills, Suburban Woods, Original Village, Olympia Club, Lakes of Olympia, Trails of Olympia Fields, Vienna Woods and Traditions) will have their branches picked up on the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of every month—weather permitting.



Please note the following requirements:

- Branches cannot be greater than 8-inches in diameter.
- Buckthorn trees will not be collected.
- Branches must be placed on or near the curb line no later than 6pm the night prior to pick up.
- **Branches cut by private contractors will not be collected. Residents and/or tree trimming contractors are responsible for the disposal of tree limbs. Failure to comply will result in citations.**
- Staff will only spend 10–15 minutes at each site. If there is a larger pile, staff may return later in the day, or the following day to collect.
- Your regular refuse company should pick up all other yard waste such as weeds, flowers or grass. Please do not mix these items with the branches.

membership in the Omega Psi Phi fraternity), EDC members presented the Richardsons with a proclamation formally welcoming Batter & Berries to the community, a framed copy of the restaurant's business license, and an Olympia Fields-opoly Monopoly game.

Craig Richardson credited his wife Tanya as the founder and creator of the Batter & Berries concept. "This idea sparked in her head." Batter & Berries "came out of her imagination, her head, her creativity," said Richardson. He also thanked President Burke for his assistance in making Batter & Berries Olympia Fields a reality. Richardson recounted how President Burke visited the Lincoln Park restaurant and invited Richardson to Olympia Fields to have a conversation about bringing Batter & Berries to the Village. President Burke "made me feel comfortable and confident that I would have support if I brought Batter & Berries to Olympia Fields," said Richardson.



OFCC Annexation

In case you didn't hear, our 2.94 square miles have grown. The Olympia Fields Country Club (OFCC) is now officially a part of the Village of Olympia Fields. The Board of Trustees voted to approve the country club's annexation at the April 17, 2023, Board of Trustees meeting. Here's what this means for the Village and its residents:

- **Increased sales tax revenue.**
The annexation is conservatively projected to generate an additional \$150,000-plus in annual sales tax revenue for the Village, which will help offset the amount of property taxes shouldered by residents. This number will increase exponentially during years that the OFCC hosts major golf events, such as the BMW Championship, which is estimated to produce an infusion of over \$400,000 in local area sales tax revenue — that's good news for Village businesses.
- **Additional property tax revenue.**
The annexation will produce additional property tax revenue for the Village. The Village receives 11% in property tax revenue, annually. The Country Club paid approximately \$475,000 in property taxes last year.
- **Increased permitting and licensing fee revenue.**
Annexation enables the OFCC to secure these permits and licenses from Olympia Fields, resulting in increased fee revenue to the Village.
- **Expanded economic growth, increased property values, and brand enhancement.**
The renowned OFCC has hosted the world's top golfers at events such as the U.S. Open, Senior Open, and KPMG PGA Women's Championship. *Golf Digest* ranks OFCC the 9th best U.S. course to host a PGA Tour event (out of 38). The BMW Championship in August is expected to draw an estimated 50-plus hours of televised coverage and over 400 local and national media, placing Olympia Fields prominently on the global stage. Already ranked as one of three premier majority-black communities in the nation by Pew Charitable Trusts, the increased visibility resulting from the OFCC annexation will only enhance our brand and increase property values—our greatest assets.
