Jeff Cartwright Honored

The Village has dedicated the maintenance facility at the Department of Public Works to a stellar retired employee, Jeffery Cartwright. Cartwright is a beloved former Assistant Director of Public Works. During his 31-year tenure, Cartwright regularly drove through the community at 5 a.m., before his official workday began, to inspect the Village. He worked tirelessly in his quest for perfection in the Village. Even after he retired in 2019, he continued to share his wisdom. The Village surprised Cartwright with this honor. He thought he was stopping by to impart some of his institutional knowledge. In typical Cartwright fashion, he brought cookies as a treat for the staff, but instead he was treated with what he called “the nicest thing ever.” The Jeffery Cartwright Maintenance Facility is a testament to Jeff’s everlasting impact on the Village of Olympia Fields.

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Multi-Year Road & Infrastructure Improvement Program

The \$500,000 road resurfacing and curb replacement project in the Wysteria subdivision, which commenced in late June 2025, has been completed. Construction crews projected 35-working days to finish but were able to bring the project to close earlier than anticipated. The Wysteria project is a component of Project 2 of the Village’s road and infrastructure improvement program. Project 2 also includes future road and infrastructure work in the Arcadia, Hawthorne Hills, and Vienna Woods subdivisions.

The \$1.5 million Project 1 road and infrastructure work in the Graymoor and Olympia Fields East subdivisions is nearing completion. The road repaving is finished, and construction crews are wrapping up the last of the culvert replacement work, grading, and restoration of affected grassy areas.

Did You Know?

- The Olympia Fields Police Department (OFPD) comprises 19 officers, who are assigned across three shifts, ensuring 24-hour police coverage for Olympia Fields residents.
- The OFPD responds to 911 calls in less than 4 minutes, on average.
- The OFPD rarely requires assistance from other jurisdictions when responding to calls; however, OFPD officers routinely assist other jurisdictions with calls.
- There are a total of 24 flock cameras in the Village of Olympia Fields, which serve as a force multiplier to OFPD to deter and solve crimes.

Branch Pick Up Ends in October

Branch pickup concludes on the third Tuesday of October for the east side of the Village and the fourth Tuesday of October for the west side of the Village.

REMINDER: The Department of Public Works (DPW) will retrieve branches that have fallen **due to inclement weather events only**, i.e., storms and high winds.

Please Note the Following:

- Branches must be 8 inches or less in diameter.
- Branch bundles should be no more than 3 feet tall and must be placed on or near the curb line.
- Buckthorn trees and yard waste, i.e., weeds, grass, and flowers, will not be collected.
- Branches cut down by residents or private landscape contractors will not be collected.
